CPJ FL INTRODUCTION OF KEYNOTE SPEAKERS AND WORKSHOP LEADERS



RICK UFFORD-CHASE is Co-Director of Stony Point Center and Co-Founder of the Multifaith Community of Living Traditions. He is a faith-based activist committed to a broad array of issues including overturning systems of white supremacy, immigration advocacy, support for those who have been incarcerated, human rights accompaniment, and combatting climate change. Rick served as the Moderator of the 216th General Assembly of the PC(USA) and is a member of the Activist Council of the Presbyterian Peace Fellowship. Rick is the author of "Faithful Resistance: Gospel Visions for the Church in a Time of Empire." *Keynote Speaker and Workshop Leader*



THE REV. JIMMIE R. HAWKINS has been Director of the Presbyterian Office of Public Witness, Washington, D.C. since 2016. Previously he served as the pastor of Covenant Presbyterian Church in New Hope Presbytery. He is committed to ecumenical relations having served on the global board of Church World Service and the National Council of Churches. He has chaired several local interfaith and ecumenical boards. Hawkins' community advocacy includes serving as a leader for the Moral Monday Movement since its start in 2013. He is a member of the NC NAACP Executive Committee and has advocated on issues of social justice before congressional and state legislative leadership. *Workshop Leader and Panelist.*



THE REV. PEGGY HOWLAND was one of the first women pastors ordained in the PC(USA) 60 years ago. She is a former Synod Moderator, twice a Presbytery Moderator and four times a Commissioner to General Assembly. Peggy has volunteered at more than 35 General Assemblies with other clergy and laypersons who care about issues before the church, and share information and concerns for peace and social justice. *Discussion leader of the **Out of Order** film on Friday.*



TIMOTHY MCKINNEY is an advocate, collaborator, community-builder and servant leader. In his years as a successful entrepreneur and professional baseball umpire, McKinney underwrote the efforts of many charitable entities. He participated in multiple humanitarian aid trips to Eastern Europe, the Caribbean, and Central and South America. From 2005 to 2009, he chose to be a full-time caretaker for his 92-year-old chronically ill great-aunt. McKinney said the experience with his aunt — who also had dementia — reminded him that there are people who cannot defend themselves. It also reinforced his God-given responsibility to give unconditional love and assistance to people who need a helping hand. Since 2009, he has lived that belief by taking on a more-than-full-time job that some would call impossible. He leads the Bithlo Transformation Effort, a grassroots effort to undo over 80 years of generational poverty and neglect in a town once known as "The Nightmare before Christmas." The Effort is recognized as a national model in place-based community and population health improvement. *Workshop Leader.*



SCOTT MAXWELL is the Sentinel's "Taking Names" columnist. He's fascinated by people and politics -- and likes giving readers information they won't get elsewhere. Scott came to the Sentinel in 1998 and has penned a column since 2002. *Panel Discussion Moderator.*



ALEX PATCHIN MCNEILL is the Executive Director of More Light Presbyterians. Alex holds a Master's of Divinity from Harvard Divinity School, and a Bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill. He is an openly transgender man, a life-long Presbyterian, and a nationally known educator and advocate for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer (LGBTQ) Christians. He played key roles organizing faith communities for the passage of Amendment 10A in the PC(USA), and for marriage equality legislation in Maryland. McNeill has also campaigned for ballot measures and legislation to promote LGBTQ rights. His journey to ordination is currently being chronicled in the documentary, **Out of Order**. *Discussion leader at the screening of the film **Out of Order** and Workshop Leader.*



THE REV. MARGERY ROSSI is the pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Wappingers Falls, NY, a member of the Presbyterian Peace Fellowship Activist Council and chairs the PPF Gun Violence Prevention group who created the Congregational Tool Kit. She has led vigils for victims of gun violence, teaches regularly on gun violence & helped create the PC(USA) policy on gun violence prevention. Mrs. Rossi is a ruling elder and Commissioned Lay Pastor.



THE REV. DR. LIZ THEOHARIS is Co-Chair of the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival with the Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II. She is the Co-Director of the Kairos Center for Religions, Rights, and Social Justice and a Founder and the Coordinator of the Poverty Initiative. She is the author of "Always with Us: What Jesus Really Said about the Poor" (Eerdmans, 2017). Liz is an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church (USA). *Keynote Speaker.*



TERESA WAGGENER, *Immigration Attorney for the Office of Immigration Issues, General Assembly PC(U.S.A.)* Teresa enjoys advising mid-councils and congregations who are calling immigrant pastors. She also strives to help Presbyterians understand and engage the injustices within this country's complex system by taking immigration law and policy and breaking it down into resources that tell the stories of those affected. Teresa has a Juris Doctor from the Brandeis School of Law and a Masters in Spirituality from Bellarmine University. Before her work at the Office of Immigration Issues, Teresa worked as a public defender, attorney for child protective services, and an immigration attorney for Kentucky Refugee Ministries. *Workshop Leader.*



THE REV. Dr. NEDDY ASTUDILLO is a Venezuelan-American, an eco-theologian, and a Presbyterian pastor working for GreenFaith as Director for Training and LatinoAmerica, an interfaith environmental organization helping to equip, inspire, and mobilize diverse communities for environmental action. In 1998, together with her husband Tom, Neddy co-founded the Angelic Organics Learning Center; a farm-based educational nonprofit building sustainable food & farm systems in Northern Illinois. Since 2013, Neddy also teaches Eco-theology at seminaries in the USA and Latin America. Her written work has been published in a diversity of books and online media.



LISA D. HABA is a licensed attorney in the state of Florida. She is a partner in The Haba Law Firm. Mrs. Haba spent seven years as an Assistant State Attorney in Seminole County, where she prosecuted human trafficking, sex crimes, child abuse, homicides, career criminals and violent crimes. Mrs. Haba tried the first human trafficking trial to occur in Seminole County and won, securing justice for the victim and a lengthy prison sentence for the trafficker. She has presented trainings statewide on the prosecution of human traffickers and how citizens can recognize the warning signs. Mrs. Haba has

received several awards for her legal advocacy. In 2017, Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi named her Prosecutor of the Year for the State of Florida for Human Trafficking prosecution. In 2016, she received the Polaris Star Award for exceptional legal advocacy in human trafficking from the Greater Orlando Human Trafficking Task Force.

II-B POLICING AND COMMUNITIES OF COLOR

"Policing and Communities of Color: From the Citadel to Rodney King to Eric Garner" dissects the history of policing in the U.S. since the days of slavery. From the beginning it was a relationship fraught with conflict and tension. Slave revolt was a very real fear and initially policing was intended to put down efforts on the part of the slaves to free themselves as in the case of the creation of the Citadel. Charges of police brutality by the African American community have been lifted up for generations and largely ignored until the advent of video evidence. It will also offer strategies to improve relations between the two and share what local communities are doing to improve relations.
